Good afternoon.

It has been fantastic to see so many parents and carers attend our phonics coffee morning today. This has been a great opportunity for you to understand how we deliver phonics in our school using 'Bug Club Phonics' and some strategies you can use at home to further support your children. We hope you found the session informative and will support the school in promoting a love for reading with your children.

Remember, phonics will support children to blend sounds to read and segment to spell but hearing a story is also extremely important!

During our staff training this week, we explored research into the most effective strategies to support reading; and reminded ourselves that reading to children is vitally important, as 90% of the vocabulary children encounter is written language and is not commonly used in speech. It is also interesting to know that a child's reading level doesn't catch up to their listening level until the age of 12/13!
