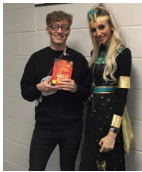
I look forward to hearing about some of the reading that has taken place at home.

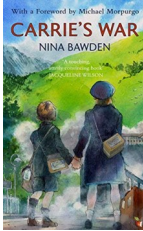
Updates and Reminders

Updates and Reminders – ParentPay

We would like to request that all parents and carers access their ParentPay account and ensure that we hold the most up to date contact details for you. All of our messages to parents and carers go out through this platform so please ensure the details are accurate. Thank you.

Parking around Westerton

Please be considerate of our neighbours. As you are aware, the school is located in a residential area, please be mindful of the residential dwellings that surround our school.

According to Highway Code Rule 243, you should not park near a school entrance — as well as anywhere that would prevent access for emergency services, at or near a bus stop, opposite or within 10 metres of a junction, over a dropped kerb, and in front of an entrance to a property.

There are a number of measures around our school to safeguard the children who attend including, zig zag lines which should be treated like double yellow lines. Double yellow lines mean no waiting at any time and there are no excuses for most drivers. The only exceptions are for disabled badge holders who are legally entitled to park where double yellows are painted.

Please also be considerate of the health of our community. Idling makes for worse air quality, which is bad for human health. Young people are at greater risk of the health impacts of air pollution because their lungs are still developing.

Rule 123 of The Highway Code states that drivers must not leave a parked vehicle unattended with the engine running or leave a vehicle engine running unnecessarily while the vehicle is stationary on a public road.
